A message from the Program Administrator of the Permanency Program Area

Welcome to Fall! I would like to take this opportunity to thank you once again for your continued support in helping care for the abused and neglected children of Stark County. Fall has historically been a busy time at the agency. As children return to school, the number of reports the hotline receives goes up. This leads to a rise in investigations and the possibility that there will be an increased number of children requiring an out of home placement.

Currently, the agency has 33 children placed in foster homes outside of Stark County. The average age of these children is 11 years old. Most of these children have siblings that were not able to be placed with them. There are a variety of reasons that sibling groups are not placed together. Over the last several months, the agency has received temporary custody of several sibling groups where children had to be separated from their brothers and sisters. Just imagine, the trauma of being removed from your parents, but then also being placed in a location as far as two hours away without your brothers and sisters.

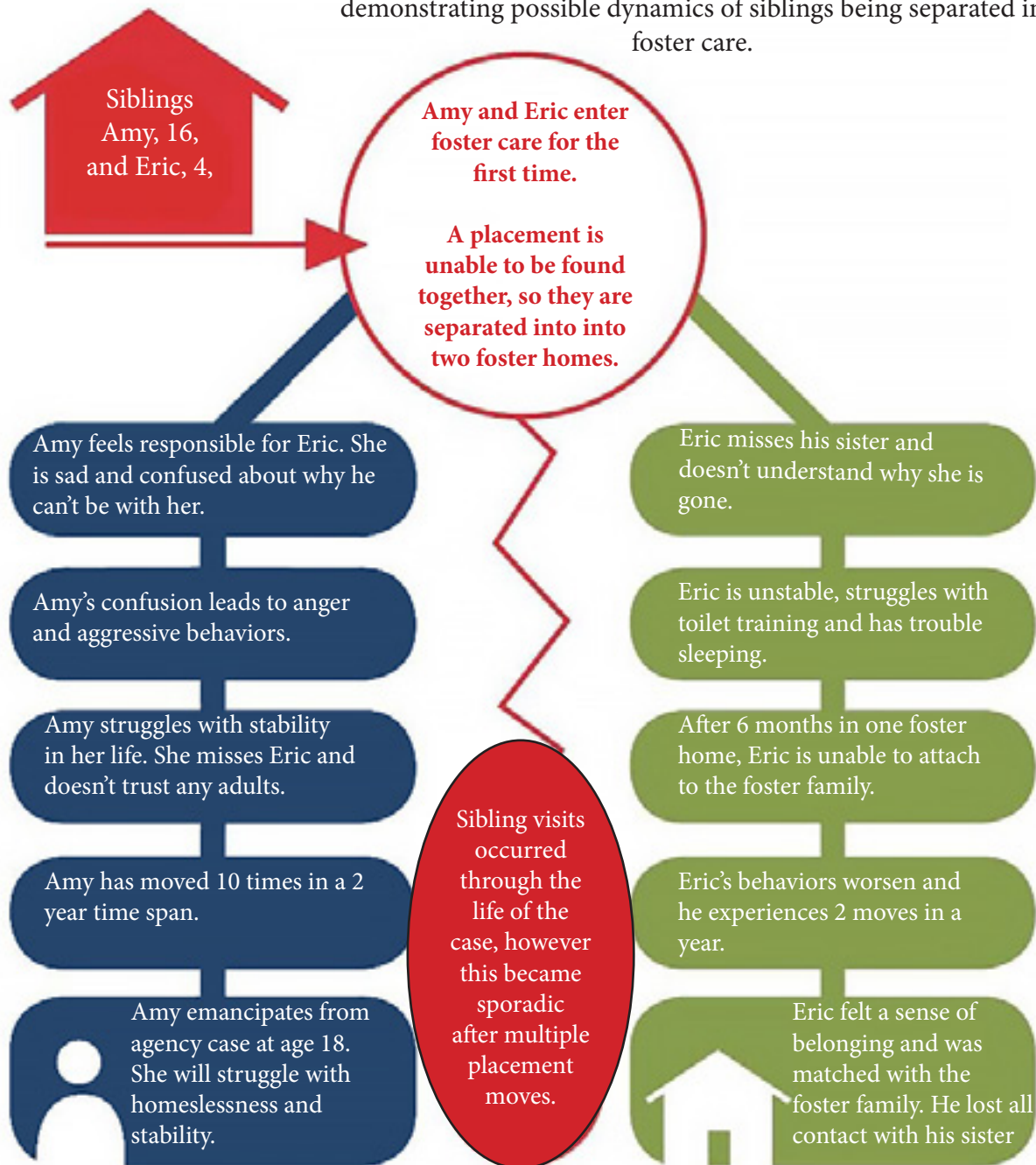
When children are placed outside of Stark County, it greatly reduces the likelihood that they will reunify with their parents. Visits with parents and siblings occur less frequently due to the distance. This can cause parents and children to disengage with each other. That's where we need your help. We need you to consider opening your hearts and homes to expanding your acceptance criteria when considering a placement. We are in desperate need of homes that can make space for brothers and sisters to be placed together. We also desperately need homes that will consider school aged children and teenagers. Over the next few months, please take a moment with your family resources worker to review your acceptance criteria and discuss if this is something your family would be able to do. Thank you for being a part of our team!

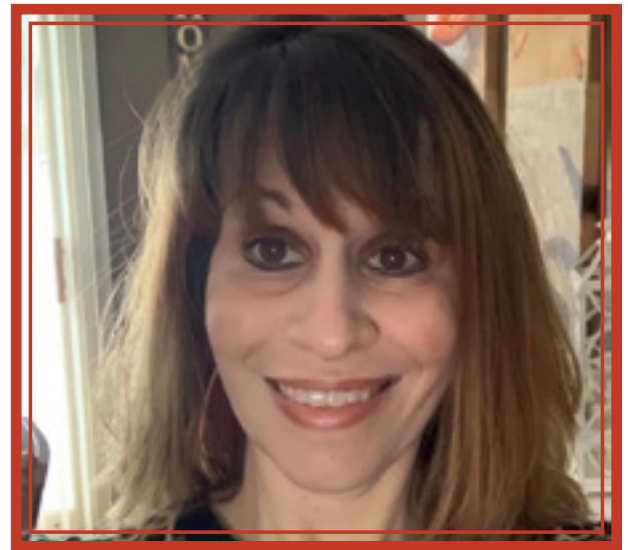

Michael and Kanyon's Adoption Story



Kanyon and my story started long before I ever even thought about deciding to adopt. It started with kids in a city dump in Mexico, with kids on the streets begging for food and money. It started with kids and skateboards in a quaint coastal city west of the Sierra Madres in México. That is where I was a full time missionary for 10 years off and on, and where my heart first broke for children who are fatherless and in desperate need of love and a place to belong. Being single and having a lifestyle free from the usual ties to American life, I had not really considered adopting

children of my own. I never thought about it because I wasn't sure that I wanted kids. Don't get me wrong, I love kids! I love teaching them, guiding them through difficulties, but I also loved it when it was time for me to go home and we parted ways for a few days until the next ministry day. I know it sounds selfish, and it was, for a missionary. But my heart broke so deeply for many of them and in my mind there was nothing I could do. In México, it could take years for someone to adopt a Mexican child, even if they did check all the right boxes, and well I didn't check all those boxes; at least in México. In 2014, I returned to the United States and immediately went back to teaching in the public school system. Again, heartbroken to see so many of my students with broken homes and families, poor, and even in foster care. But again, I thought there was nothing that I could do about it, so I put it off in the back of mind, so I would not have to worry about it so much. One day, a student of mine who was in foster care, told me that she felt that I would be such a great foster parent and that I should do it. I said, "Do what?" She said, "become a foster parent!" I told her that I was single, and really hadn't thought about having kids, and maybe I should be married first. And her response was, "so what! There's tons of single foster parents and you would be amazing!" Well, that got the ball rolling at least in my head. I started researching what the requirements were to be a foster parent. Later on the year, I went on another mission trip to Cuba, with a lady from my church who had been a foster parent for many years and even



adopted a number of them. She encouraged me to at least check it out. After coming back from Cuba, I received three FB posts about my now son Kanyon. They were posts that the county had sent out to get the word out about the children who were up for adoption. The three posts were from three different friends of mine, none of whom know each other. All three of the FB messages came at the exact same time! Then, one of the ladies that sent me one of the FB messages with the post, said to me, that she believed that this boy was my son, and that I should

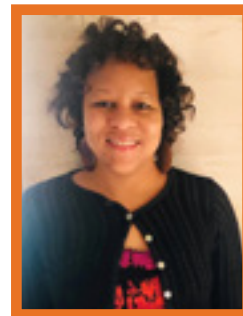
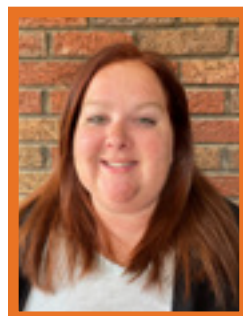
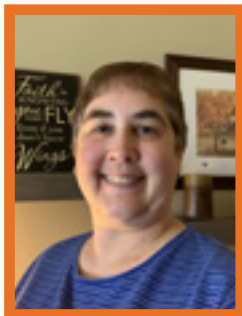
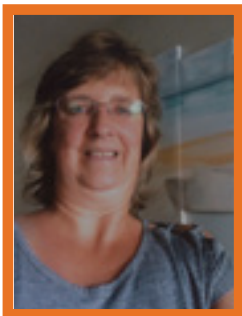
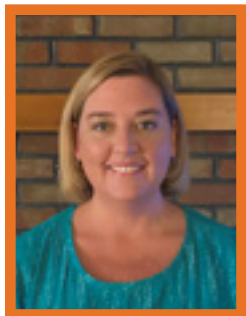
call about him. That just hit me like a ton of bricks. What if this was my son? What if God was speaking to me to adopt this little boy and help to give him a better life and better opportunities in life? So I called. The instant I saw Kanyon's picture on the post, I could feel a sense of urgency and destiny all at the same time. I knew nothing about him, but felt like I knew him in my heart at the same time. I just knew that he had a purpose and specific destiny that I was supposed to be a part of. I started with a private agency and then changed over to SCJFS. I did my foster parent courses and started the process. He lived with me for a little over 6 months when I finally got to adopt him on November 19, 2018. I can tell you that it has not been a smooth road to travel, but I will say that it has been worth every bump in the road. Worth it to see where he was and where he is now and even more so, to see where he is going. Fostering to Adopt is not for the faint of heart for sure, and I probably gave up about 25 times a day before it was all over, but the overall benefits of seeing a little boy's life changed and see his face light up when he experiences something new that he has never experienced and may have never experienced if I had not come along, is priceless! The lesson I learned from all those kids in the dump, on the streets, all my students in broken homes and foster care, was to be the change you want to see in the world. Be the change no matter how big or small, even if the change comes in the form of one little life at a time!

Family, Children and Adult Services Procedure Letter No. 348 COVID-19

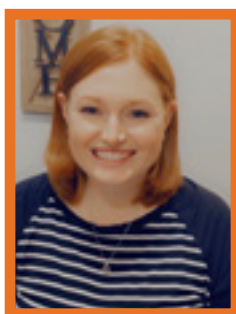
Temporary Policy Training Requirements:

- A minimum of 30 training hours to be completed through in person classroom, or online training with or without a live trainer. A dated training certificate must be provided to the agency for all online training completed.
- A maximum of 10 training hours can be completed through supplemental materials such as books, videos, and participation in therapy with your foster child.
- Any online training that is completed while PL 348 is in effect will be counted as classroom training in upcoming recertifications, even those who are recertifying after PL 348 expires.
- PL 348 will expire on 12/01/2020. After this date, all families must follow the training requirements as stated in rule 5101:2-5-33.



5101:2-5-33 Foster Caregiver Preplacement and Continuing Training Requirements:

- A minimum of 40 hours of continuous training must be completed within the 2-year certification. Stark County JFS Policy requires 20 hours be completed each year.
- A minimum of 40 hours of continuous training must be completed within the 2-year certification. Stark County JFS Policy requires 20 hours be completed each year.
- A minimum of 20 hours must be in person classroom training.
- A maximum of 20 hours can be completed through live synchronous distance learning (online training with a live instructor).
- A maximum of 10 training hours can be completed through supplemental materials such as books, videos, online training without a live trainer, and participation in therapy with your foster child.
